Come to the Next PRNC Meeting, Wednesday, September 25th at 7:30 p.m. at the Point Richmond Community Center:

- The City Council is considering a resolution to change the name of Western Drive, north of I-580 to Stenmark Drive after Captain J.O. Stenmark, a historic figure relevant to the area. Representatives from the City will give us the background of this request, answer questions, and give PRNC members the opportunity to voice their opinions regarding this proposed change.
- After serving as the sponsor of the Farmers' Market since its beginning, The Point Richmond Business Association (PRBA) is no longer able to be the community sponsor of the Market. The PRBA has done a fantastic job. This year the Market has become a family event with, in addition to great produce and prepared foods a Jumpy House and Beer/Wine Garden. The Market will not continue to exist without community sponsorship. We will receive a report from the Market Management and the PRBA followed by discussion of the problems and solutions.
- Over the last few years the Gateway Foundation has donated significant amounts to support projects that benefit Point Richmond. Last year the PRNC received over \$2000 to help us complete the mural on the south portal of the Dornan Tunnel. Jeff Lee will report on the history of the Foundation, its activities, and procedures to obtain money for projects.

Point Richmond Neighborhood Council General Meeting Minutes Wednesday, August 28, 2013

1. The meeting was called to order at 7:35pm

2. Minutes of July 31, 2013 meeting were approved.

3. Police Report (Sergeant Armando Moreno <u>amoreno@richmondpd.net</u>, (510) 965-4916) (Non-emergency number for police assistance 510-233-1214). Sergeant Moreno will be attending our meetings for the remainder of this year. He introduced himself and spoke briefly about his tenure with the Richmond Police Department. He reviewed the crimes from the last month, indicating a spike in auto theft and burglary. 14 crimes were reported. He reminded us to call if we see anything suspicious and to make sure that we lock our cars and our home windows and doors. He spoke about the new Predictive Policing Program that has now been implemented. Officers are sent to areas where crimes are likely to occur.

4. President's Report (Margaret Jordan, President (510) 412-3673) Margaret mentioned that the tunnel is scheduled to open September 9. The Formula Restaurant Ordinance passed the Planning Commission and will now go to the City Council. A date for that has not been set. Non-profit status issue continues to be a work in process, as does the progress on the Wig-Wags.

5. Membership Report (Charmain Tyler (510) 334-7267) Membership drive continues and our group is growing! We are only as strong as our membership!

6. Treasurer's Report (Garry Hurlbut (510) 547-8111) General Fund \$8,820.28, Bishop Alley Fund \$711.06, and WigWag Fund \$2,970.94 (for which we are custodians). **Total Balance: \$12,502.28**

7. Report from Land Use Design Review Committee

- Overview of the basic program of development plans at Terminal One Rod Satre reported that there is an investor from China who has expressed interest in Terminal One. This group has been working with developers and has been informed that the asking price for the 13.6 acres is \$10 million. They are aware that going through LUDRC is the 1st step in any progress with this project. October should bring more information on this issue, and a website with information is going to be developed. That information will be shared with the membership once we have it.
- 2. 0 Montana Individuals who were to present were not in attendance.

8. Richmond's Mortgage Relief Efforts (Patrick Lynch) Patrick Lynch spoke about "What is and what isn't" surrounding the Richmond Mortgage Relief Efforts. 9. Non-Profit: Campus California (Julie Wedge, Public Relations Director) The average US household discards 177 lbs. of textiles annually and only 15% of all textiles are reused or recycled. The remaining 85% make their way to landfills. Campus California is a nonprofit whose mission is to support sustainability projects and work toward California's solid waste reduction goals. They collect and sell donated items, working in cooperation with communities most affected by global climate change and those living in poverty both locally and globally. Restoring Native Oysters to SF Bay (Christopher Lim, Living Shoreline Program Manager, The Watershed Project) The Olympia Oyster is native to San Francisco Bay, but numbers are low due to overharvesting, degraded water quality and silting over of habitat. The Watershed Project's Living Shoreline Initiative is helping by building and monitoring habitat for native oysters. Together with scientists, volunteers and students, work is being done to restore that habitat. The first community constructed oyster reef in San Francisco Bay is being constructed at Point Pinole Regional Shoreline.
