Point Richmond Neighborhood Council General Meeting Minutes Wednesday, July 30, 2014

1.The meeting was called to order at 7:37 p.m. Margaret welcomed everyone to the Hotel Mac as our venue for the meeting this month. The minutes from June were approved with no changes. Kyle and Genn Toffey were welcomed as new members and new residents in Pt. Richmond.

2. Police Report (Captain Gagan) (Non-emergency number for police assistance 510-233-1214) and PRNC Safety and Crime Prevention Report (Jon Sutinen, jsutinen@yahoo.com): Captain Gagan presented on the recent crime in the Pt. Richmond area. He appreciates the way the neighbors look out for one another, pay attention to their surroundings and call when there is suspicious activity. He introduced Mitch and Ben who are officers assigned to foot and bike patrol in Pt. Richmond. Their hours are approximately noon-10 pm Tuesday-Friday and their presence will be seen more frequently due to the higher crime in the area. There are three districts in the Richmond area. Captain Gagan is in the Southern District. Captain Gagan reported some shocking crime in the months of June and July and spoke to the homicide as being a domestic crime. The robbery at the pharmacy is believed to be one of a string of similar crimes as the robber was seeking narcotic drugs during this robbery. Captain Gagan reported that this is a very common crime since the use of prescription drugs is very prevalent. The most disturbing crime was that of a robbery of \$200 from a resident who was getting money from the ATM machine. A \$5,000 reward has been posted. There is also another \$5,000 reward posted from another source, which increases the total to \$10,000. The crime occurred around 6:00 pm and the victim was knocked to the ground and injured. A question about organized neighborhood watches was asked and it was reported that there are several, but more could be formed. 3. **President's Report (Margaret Jordan, 510-412-3673**): Margaret mentioned that the next meeting, August 27th will be a mayoral candidate's night. There will not be a regular Neighborhood Council meeting that night. The location is TBD. Jean Knox is home and recovering from her injury.

4. **Membership Report (Charmain Tyler 510-334-7267):** There are currently 124 paid members. There are 105 people that paid last year, but have not renewed their membership this year.

5. **Treasurer's Report (Garry Hurlbut 510-547-8111):** We gave \$500 to the music festival, which we have done in the past, and sent flowers to Jean Knox. General Fund \$9,125.72; Bishop Alley Fund \$711.06; Wig Wag Fund \$2,970.94. **Total Balance: \$12,807.72.**

6. Report from Land Use Design Review Committee: No report.

7. **How to Prevent Identity Theft:** Detective Tagorda from Richmond Police Department Property Crimes Unit. He reported an increase in identity theft and mail theft. Thieves will sort through mail and try to figure out personal details of your life. It is easier than you think to find out information on people. Thieves use this information to open up credit accounts, print checks, etc. He reported that people get this information from online sources, ATM machines, and trash. He highly recommended that people invest in cross-cut shredders and shred personal information rather than recycle it. In lieu of that, you can take your personal paperwork to a document shredding company. Another recommendation is to pay all bills online (with password protected wi-fi) to avoid using the mailbox. Another tip is to only use credit cards and not debit cards because if there is an unauthorized charge, the credit company will reimburse the account faster than a bank will for a debit card.

8. **Report on Milo Foundation:** Lynn Tingle reported on Milo Foundation. Milo was named after Lynn's Australian Shepherd. In 20 years, The Milo Foundation has rescued and found homes for more than 25,000 animals that faced euthanasia in California's high-kill shelters. They have a 283 acre sanctuary in Mendocino County and a new Intake and Adoption Center in Point Richmond, designed for rescue, including dog yards, cat rooms, and their own 3/4 acre Dog Park. When animals are rescued they will check for a micro-chip and post the information on Next Door Point Richmond. They try to find owners. Milo is the first rescue organization to help the city and county of Merced. The foundation has located on Garrard Street after moving from San Rafael and is in the process of building dog runs. They welcome volunteers from 7 a.m.–7 p.m. The foundation is in need of funds due to the move and building onto the space. Lynn would appreciate any donations. They are looking for 200 people to commit to donating \$20 a month to help them with cash flow. The campaign is called 20/200 and donations can be made online at www.milofoundation.org.

9. Writer Coach Connection: June Pagelinan reported on this organization and recognized Mary Lee Cole as the founder of Writer Coach Connection. The organization brings the volunteers into the schools. The coaches work with students on writing, comprehension, and critical thinking. Currently, the organization is working with Richmond High School and work with students at the level they are at. The group started in Berkeley, then to Oakland, and now to Richmond. Last year, there were 100 coaches who worked with 184 students. This year they are expanding to Kennedy High School. Mary Hoffman is a volunteer and a business owner in Pt. Richmond. She reported that she has enjoyed her work and will expand to Kennedy High School this fall. She also reported the excellent training and support she has received from the organization. Mary recommends this group for anyone looking for a fulfilling volunteer commitment. No experience is required. Mary Lee Cole started this program in 2000 and the program grew like wildfire. The total volunteer commitment is 12-14 hours during the school year. It's been a very important part of the students' lives as they have adults who come in and care enough to give their time to help. She recommended that people consider joining the group.
